Moody Air Force Base

Moody Air Force Base was named in memory of Maj. George Putnam Moody, an early Air Force pioneer killed in May 1941 while serving with the Beech Aircraft Company in Wichita, Kansas. At the time of his death, the major was working on the inspection board for AT-10 transitional trainers which were later sent to Moody.

The 23rd Wing organizes, trains and employs combat-ready A-10C, HC-130P, HH-60G, pararescuemen, force protection assets and personnel consisting of approximately 5,500 military and civilian personnel including geographically separated units in Nevada, Florida, Arizona and Georgia. The wing executes worldwide



close air support, force protection and rescue forces to include combat search and rescue and personnel recovery in support of humanitarian interests, United States national security and the global war on terrorism.

The wing's aircraft include the A-10C, HC-130P and HH-60G. The A-10C Thunderbolt II is the first Air Force aircraft specially designed for close air support of ground forces. The twin-engine jet aircraft can be used against all ground targets, including tanks and other armored vehicles. The HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopter provides a rescue forces platform for the USAF through its ability to operate in a vast array of rescue scenarios. The HC-130P Combat King flies low-level missions into hostile territory to conduct rescues and to provide air refueling for our rescue helicopters.



Among many other achievements, Moody won the Commander-in-Chief's Installation Excellence Award for 1991 and the 1994 Verne Orr Award, which is presented by the Air Force Association to the unit that most effectively uses human resources to accomplish its mission. In September 2008, the wing was also awarded the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award for the ninth time in its illustrious history.
